

It's not about the next best thing, it's about the next right thing. The 6th Generation of GLOCK pistols isn't chasing the next trend, it's about integrating customer feedback that supports the shooter and their best performance. Whether you're pushing for faster stage times, cleaner hits, or simply a more confident experience during long training days, the Gen6 line was engineered with you in mind.

From the first grip, the difference is noticeable. The updated frame geometry, subtle palm swell, extended beavertail, and improved grip texture work together to help the pistol settle naturally into your hands. That means less effort spent fighting the gun and more focus on executing your stage plan. A higher grip reduces muzzle rise, which helps you track the dot or sights more efficiently and get back on target faster—especially during rapid strings of fire. The thumb rest is another incredible addition, not only is it a valuable index point for your thumb, but it also allows for more stability when managing recoil. Over the course of a match or a high-round training session, those improved ergonomics translate into less questions and more focused performance.

One of the most practical upgrades for shooters is the flat-faced trigger and shorter distance from the trigger to the rear of the frame. It doesn't just look modern—it changes how the pistol feels. It helps isolate your trigger finger, and it just feels right.

The result is more consistent trigger placement, improved control, and more reliable follow-up shots. When fractions of a second matter, that consistency can mean the difference between a solid stage or a championship.

Even the optics ready system is shooter focused. The installation of your favorite optic is simple, a characteristic that is always valued when new products are developed. The optic plates act as a stabilizer, while the optic itself screws directly into the slide with more thread attachment for a reliable and durable mounting solution. This means fewer variables and more confidence that your optic will hold zero throughout a match or training cycle.

Importantly, all of these updates come without sacrificing what GLOCK shooters value most: reliability and durability. The Gen6 design maintains the Safe Action® System and rugged construction that has earned trust across competitive, law enforcement, and military communities. You're not trading dependability for change, you're getting refinements layered into a proven foundation. That reliability lets you focus on shooting.

In practical terms, the GLOCK Gen6 line helps you shoot flatter, track sights faster, and maintain consistency under stress. The Gen6 pistols don't try to change how you shoot. They simply help you shoot better.





GLOCK Perfection: A Promise Kept for Four Decades

“Make it simple, make it perfect.” Following this motto, Austrian engineer and ingenious founder, Gaston Glock first entered the U.S. market, the industry was dominated by steel and aluminum-framed handguns. Polymer was unconventional, striker-fired systems were underestimated and a 17-round magazine capacity was borderline radical.



GLOCK, Inc. officially begins selling its first pistols from the newly opened U.S. headquarters in Smyrna, GA, marking the company's first step into the American market.

As the leading manufacturer of firearms for law enforcement and qualified citizens around the globe, GLOCK has always taken a proactive position on what must remain a top priority when handling firearms: safety.


This commitment began in the 1980s, when Austrian engineer, Gaston Glock, developed a then-radical design for the Ministry of Defense. Integrated into the design were three independent mechanical safeties: a trigger safety, a firing pin safety, and a drop safety. At that time, such attention to mechanical safety was rare. For instance, many legacy designs were not "drop safe." Mr. Glock did not compromise.

From the beginning, GLOCK dedicated itself to highlighting and promoting safety. Sales and training programs were specifically designed to educate customers and operators by consistently reinforcing the Four Rules of Firearms Safety.

Through dealer training programs in the 1980s, GLOCK brought safety instruction directly to consumers—a practice that continues today. Every GLOCK pistol package includes a firearms safety brochure and a gun lock for safe storage. The company also provides safety support materials such as range posters through the GLOCK Range Program and partners with law enforcement nationwide by supplying firearm safety kits. In addition, GLOCK supports industry initiatives such as those of the NSSF, which promote responsible ownership and national shooting sports programs.

Safety in Training and Sport

The safety thread runs deeply through GLOCK Training programs. Beginning with law enforcement instruction in the 1980s and continuing today under GLOCK Professional, the Four Rules are part of every course—briefed at the start of each training day, even in non-firing classes such as the Armorer's Course. When



handling real firearms, safety is always primary and remains the first objective of GLOCK instructors.

Launched in the early 1990s, the GLOCK Sport Shooting Foundation (GSSF) also prioritizes firearms safety and safety awareness in its mission statement. By instructing owners in safe handling techniques, GSSF has educated tens of thousands of shooters over the decades.

Take The Pledge

For over 10 years, GLOCK has recognized their commitment to safety, highlighting GLOCK's unwavering commitment to responsible firearm ownership and safety education through this national campaign to Take The Pledge for firearm safety. The program was created to reinforce awareness of firearm safety best-practices across all audiences - new shooters, experienced gun owners, and law enforcement alike. By centralizing messag-

ing under a simple, memorable call to action, GLOCK ensures that safety remains the foundation of every interaction with their products.

GLOCK provides digital resources, shareable graphics, and educational resources to promote safe storage, handling, and proper use. Whether it is through law enforcement agencies distributing firearm safety kits or through Team GLOCK athletes modelling best practices on the range, this year-round campaign represents a unified, company-wide commitment: to make safety second-nature.

"As a retired Army sniper and gunsmith, I've always respected GLOCK reliability, but a recent elk hunt in Colorado proved it firsthand. I was with a friend in the backcountry of Gypsum, Colorado without cell service. I was looking through the wood line at one point, and then looked back down before I heard what sounded like a charging horse coming from the woods. A large black bear was charging at me at full speed. When my rifle malfunctioned, I drew my GLOCK 29 pistol and fired while moving backward. The pistol stopped the bear just feet from me and gave me the chance to end the encounter safely.

I walked away uninjured because my sidearm performed flawlessly. That experience confirmed exactly why I carry and recommend GLOCK pistols."

"I wanted to share an experience that proved the durability of my G45 in a way I never expected. While helping my son load lawn equipment, I placed my pistol on my front driver's-side tire—something I had never done before and will never do again. We were in a hurry, and as I backed up, I heard the pistol hit the driveway. I stopped immediately and heard plastic scraping against concrete. When I got out, my suspicions were confirmed: my 5,900-lb Ford Raptor had just been parked on top of my G45. The pistol was still holstered on the ground. When I picked it up to clear and inspect it, the bottom cap of the magazine fell off and all the ammunition scattered. Other than heavy scraping and a destroyed mag, the pistol itself looked surprisingly solid. After returning home, I inspected it more thoroughly—sights, lighting, and especially the magazine release were all still intact. Yesterday I took it to the range to see if it would run, and it performed flawlessly through 100 rounds. This mattered a lot to me because my G45 and G36 are my everyday carry pistols that I trust with my life and my family's safety. When I went to the local gun shop, the gentleman behind the counter was trying to sell me another platform. When I told the story, he just went silent. He finally said, 'You just gave me the best testimony for someone looking for a durable EDC platform!' My G45 fell from a 35" tire, had a 5,900-lb truck parked on it, and still operated exactly as I've come to expect. Other than cosmetic damage and a ruined magazine, it's flawless. I now fully understand why my friends in law enforcement rely on this platform. Thank you for producing such a reliable, high-quality firearm."

NRAAM 2025 GLOCK COUNTRY

The 2025 NRA Annual Meetings & Exhibits held special significance for GLOCK, taking place just minutes from the U.S. headquarters in Smyrna, Georgia. With the show set in what many proudly call GLOCK Country, the event carried a sense of hometown pride for GLOCK advocates. Employees, partners, and lifelong fans felt the difference—this year wasn't just another NRAAM; it was an opportunity to welcome the firearms community into GLOCK's own backyard.

Show attendees traveled from across the United States to visit the GLOCK booth, where the GLOCK x AIMPOINT pistols drew steady crowds. Many visitors saw the collaboration for the first time in person, and the excitement around the product launch was unmistakable. Conversations, photos, and hands-on engagement filled the booth throughout the weekend.

An interactive historical timeline offered visitors a deeper look into GLOCK's decades of innovation. 

35 YEARS OF GSSF®

In 1991, GLOCK, Inc. created a program of shooting competitions which was unprecedented and unique. The program was called the GLOCK Sport Shooting Foundation® or GSSF. GLOCK's founder, Gaston Glock, fully supported the venture to create a community of GLOCK sport shooters. The first GSSF match was held in October 1991, at the old County Police Firearms Range. There were only a few dozen participants/competitors, but, as the saying goes, it was the start of something big.

I have been reviewing old images and documents from the mid-1990s on, and it is amazing how much has changed yet remains in some ways the same. Through the 1990s, the number of matches increased, and more staff were brought on to meet demand. Two of the early volunteer range officers, Scott Gilbertson and Cindy Noyes, eventually became employees and contributed to the overall program over the decades. Initially, the GSSF courses of fire were designed to be open to all levels of responsible citizens. That continues today. Mr. Glock wanted to showcase his products while opening GLOCK to the

community, and competitions were one way to do that. GLOCK pistols were newer in the '90s, with qualities that were not widely known. Competition would confirm GLOCK pistols safety, reliability, accuracy, and shoot ability. The early matches had a few divisions or categories of different GLOCK pistols. As the years and GLOCK model numbers increased, so did the divisions. The Subcompact Division addressed GLOCK pistols with subcompact frames, like the G26 and G27 models, which were revolutionary in the mid-1990s. The Competition Division expanded with the introduction of the G34 and G35 competition pistols. Expanding divisions for different GLOCK models ensured that no matter what GLOCK customers owned, there was a place to compete. The multiple avenues encouraged a G17 pistol owner to possibly try a subcompact G26 model for more shooting! This inclusiveness and growth continue to this current day.

Another prominent period was the coming of "Gunny," famous actor and former GLOCK spokesperson, R. Lee Ermey. He took a personal interest in GSSF matches because as a US



Marine he was all about shooting accurately. He championed the GLOCK Gunny Challenge, where accomplished competitors shot in a special event at the GSSF Annual Match. With the Gunny Challenge as an accompanying celebrity, interest steadily increased. Gunny's interactions with competitors did much to foster goodwill and positive impressions for GSSF. His memory continues to this day. The Gunny Challenge is run yearly at the Annual Match, with GLOCK pistols proving their reliability, accuracy, and highly efficient performance.

Other notable touchpoints over time include adaptive competitors joining in on the competition at GSSF. Over the years, GSSF has had members who had significant mobility challenges. Some needed powered wheelchairs, others had visual difficulties, and more. The basic GSSF course designs allowed them to participate safely with whatever level of assistance needed. Several high-level competitors in other disciplines have utilized GSSF matches as an introduction to safe and fun shooting for newer firearm owners. And finally, shooters who are well-seasoned have participated in GSSF into their 80s!

Thirty-five years after the first match in 1991, GSSF remains relevant, because it continues to grow with the firearms community it serves. As GLOCK introduces new pistols, the program evolves alongside them, expanding the roster and refining divisions so members always have a place to compete. From early full-size models to subcompacts, competition pistols, and today's expanded lineup, GSSF has adapted while keeping its original focus on safe, accessible competition for shooters of all experience levels.

That approach has fueled consistent, meaningful growth. In 2025, GSSF surpassed 50,000 members, becoming the largest sport shooting organization in the United States. This milestone reflects decades of steady participation and trust built through well-run matches, inclusive course design, and a commitment to responsible shooting. Thirty-five years in, GSSF continues to move forward—welcoming new shooters, engaging long-time competitors, and remaining a central gathering point for the GLOCK shooting community.

MORE THAN A SPORT

HOW ONE COMPETITOR FOUND HEALING, GROWTH, AND PURPOSE THROUGH SPORT SHOOTING

In 2023, first-time competitor DeShawn Johnson attended a GLOCK Sport Shooting Foundation (GSSF) match in Lawrenceburg, Kentucky. Like many newcomers, he was initially uncertain about the process. The GSSF staff guided him through the match, offering encouragement and support, and fellow competitor Fred King even suggested he return the following day to try an additional division.

What began as a single weekend of sport shooting quickly became something more. DeShawn, a combat veteran, had faced significant personal challenges in recent years, including the loss of his son and father within a short span of time. Those hardships, combined with the struggles of grief and recovery, left him searching for a new sense of purpose. After dedicating himself to personal growth, he discovered GSSF.

At his first match, DeShawn was very apprehensive and nearly left before competing, but he pressed forward and soon experienced the values that GSSF is built upon: safety, camaraderie, and support. Though he did not shoot particularly well, he left with something far more important—the reminder of what it meant to feel part of a team. The encouragement he received that day carried the familiar spirit of his time in the Army.

From there, DeShawn's journey accelerated. He attended more matches, gained confidence, and earned recognition for his commitment. Along the way, he was introduced to the world of USPSA and IDPA by Team GLOCK Captain, Shane Coley. Inspired, DeShawn began competing in practical shooting, refining his skills with top instructors and taking part in more than 50 various sport shooting disciplines in 2024.



Although his schedule grew busy with competitions across different disciplines, GSSF remained a foundation for him. In 2025, after a year away, he returned to a GSSF match in Virginia. What he encountered was exactly what he remembered: a community that welcomed him back without hesitation. That sense of belonging reignited his commitment, and he soon earned multiple first-place finishes in the Guardian division. With just one more win, he will achieve the title of GSSF Master.

For DeShawn, the matches are more than competition. They represent connection, healing, and purpose. His story illustrates how GSSF continues to be more than an entry point into shooting sports. It is, for many, a family.

"This community saved my life. It gave me something to be passionate about, something to look forward to. It motivates me to stay sober, live healthy, and give my best every day. The matches are my sanctuary, my therapy. The people are my friends, my teammates, my family. GSSF gave me more than a sport—it gave me my life back."

First Impressions

When I first arrived at the range, I was pretty nervous. My shooting competition experience was all in archery, and I had never competed in a firearms match before. I walked in and was instantly welcomed by not only the range staff, but also by the other competitors. Everyone was talking about their equipment and were happy to share pointers on how to be ready for the buzzer and get the best score. There were adults there of every age and a few women there too! It was truly an inclusive environment. By the way, GLOCK offers a Women's Division in these GSSF matches.

Building Lasting Memories

I believe we almost always remember our first experiences, and I built some lasting memories by competing in this match. I love sports that, even though you are competing against others, you are really competing against yourself.

Since I had not competed in the competition before, I was unsure what to expect. The rules are: you shoot a GLOCK pistol for five ends at different distances and timed for 15 seconds each. Sounds easy, right? Well, I thought so until the buzzer chimed, and I thought, "Wait, what!" For my first attempt, I used

my GLOCK 43 pistol. Then I shot another round, but I used a GLOCK 44 pistol that I was able to rent for free, because I was shooting the GSSF match. By the time I had competed in these two rounds, I was ready to get to the range and practice to improve my score for the next week's match.

The Importance of Practice

Practice is a must. I'm a pretty good shot, when all of the conditions are controlled. I have time to aim, focus and press the trigger back. However, I've learned that when I have to start with a buzzer and shoot ten shots in 15 seconds, I have a lot to improve upon. I used these matches as a fun way to force myself to take time to go to the range, and I did improve my scores while having a great time.

Looking Forward

I had so much fun shooting the GSSF matches that I purchased a new gun, a GLOCK 20 pistol chambered in 10mm. I named her "Line Cutter." I look forward to competing in more of these matches. A DAY WITH GLOCK®: A STUDENT'S TAKE ON THE GLOCK® ARMORER'S COURSE


Before I took the GLOCK Armorer's Course, my experience maintaining my GLOCK pistols was patchy and inconsistent. I invariably relied on tutorials, video calls with trusted friends, and web searches every time I sat down to do routine cleaning. Sure, I could field strip and clean my guns, but it always took longer than it needed too. I felt a real need for in-person instruction. I learn best hands-on, so I signed up for the GLOCK Armorer's Course to get some experience in a classroom setting. I'm glad I did. After a full day with an expert instructor and a GLOCK 17 pistol on the table, I left with greater confidence in my ability to maintain my pistols.

Why I Took the Course

Over the last decade, I've taken a growing interest in firearms. Simply put, I wanted formal training. I didn't want to just tinker, I wanted to do it correctly. To me, this isn't much different from firearms training itself: if you want to do things well, you start with fundamentals. The GLOCK Armorer's Course promised standardized instruction from a certified GLOCK Professional Instructor, and it looked like the right fit.

Course Overview and Structure

The eight-hour course results in a three-year certification as a

GLOCK Certified Armorer. Morning instruction covered safety, basic operation, and a review of GLOCK pistol generations. Each student received a G17 model for hands-on work, which included field stripping, detailed slide and frame teardown, reassembly, and function checks. The instructor also covered cleaning, lubrication, and troubleshooting. Most of my classmates were law enforcement, so I was a bit out of my element, but they were welcoming and helpful whenever I had questions. The day ended with written and practical exams demonstrating disassembly and reassembly. I left with a parts tray, GLOCK tool, armorer's mat, and a manual that will be invaluable for troubleshooting.

Hands-On Work with Training Pistols

Bench time was much of the class. We practiced disassembly grips, field-stripping, and detailed work on the slide and frame. Repetition makes any process second nature, so I ran each step several times to get it into my head. I especially appreciated finally understanding the GLOCK Safe Action® System: three passive safeties—the trigger safety, firing-pin safety, and drop safety. Each engage and disengage as the trigger is released and pulled.

Common Maintenance: Wear, Fixes, and Lube Points

Basic maintenance includes field stripping, cleaning the barrel, slide, frame, and magazines, and applying a light film of oil at contact points like slide rails, barrel hood, and the trigger bar/

connector. The rule is simple: clean first, then protect. A light film of oil—not a puddle—keeps things reliable. The armorer's manual includes a troubleshooting chart with probable causes and corrections. It also has a quick reference chart for function checks.

Testing and Certification

The course wraps up with written and practical exams. Passing qualifies you as a factory-certified armorer authorized to maintain, troubleshoot, and service all GLOCK models covered in the course. Certification lasts three years, and graduates receive a digital certificate.

Final Impressions

The course is ideal for agency armorers, instructors, procurement staff, or serious owners who want to go beyond basic cleaning. As for me, I'm glad I took it. I won't be servicing agency weapons, but this class gave me a stronger foundation for my own GLOCK pistols. I don't get lost in terminology as easily, and if I do, the manual is at hand for quick reference. A note on eligibility: GLOCK Armorer Courses are typically restricted to military, law enforcement, dealers, FFLs, and security contractors. Civilians can qualify though by joining the GLOCK Sport Shooting Foundation (GSSF), which opens access to select GLOCK Training courses.

WOMEN'S "WHYS" FEMALES IN COMPETITIVE SHOOTING

I can still remember standing in line to check in for my first shooting competition. I was one of only a handful of females that showed up to compete that weekend. I borrowed equipment from friends, and I had almost no idea what I would be doing there that weekend. All I knew was that I needed both a rifle and a pistol, and so I showed up willing to learn with my rifle and a GLOCK 19X pistol.

After that first competition over 6 years ago, I was hooked. I had no idea there were so many skilled and knowledgeable women out there on the range competing. I've been so fortunate to meet and work with some of the most talented women in the firearm industry. Each woman has a different background coming into shooting sports, but it seems we all have a similar experience starting out and a growing passion to help others build the same skill.

For many women, stepping into their first competition isn't about chasing a title, it's about finding confidence and life balance. It's a new challenge in the middle of busy, demanding lives. That's how it was for my friend Brittney Underwood, a mom and military wife. Without a professional shooting background, she decided to compete to reconnect with something she enjoyed and to model strength and perseverance for her family.

"I figured the worst thing that could happen is that I'd fail and learn something" she told me.

Between her husband's deployments, parenting her young children, and the chaos of everyday life, she's learned to carve out time for her own goals. She does this by training late, rising early, and leaning on the support of her husband, Payne, who encour-

ages her every step of the way. For Brittney and so many women like her, competition isn't just about shooting, it's about finding purpose and community in a season of life that often demands everything of them.

While Brittney found that competition shooting added balance to her life, my good friend Jenay DeCauzin found it as a new way to test her limits. Her background as a successful CrossFit athlete made the transition feel slightly less intimidating, knowing she could at least handle the pressure and the physical side of The Tactical Games(R) competition.

"I had minimal firearm training going into my first competition," she told me. "My goal was simply to stay safe and learn."

But what she found, in addition to a lot of success, was an incredibly welcoming community of people eager to share their knowledge of firearm safety and training. Jenay credits the generosity of others for helping her grow into a well-rounded, confident competitor who rose to become the Elite Female National Champion. She now helps newcomers through her own training group, Day One Perspective.

Another phenomenal female shooter and a huge role model of mine, Tes Salb, began her competitive shooting career decades before I first met her. When she was a kid, she dreamed of competing as an equestrian in the Olympics but found herself training as a young Modern Pentathlete instead. A competition that combines running, swimming, shooting, fencing, and

horseback riding. From there she then competed in international pistol competitions, as well as USPSA, 3-gun matches, and The Tactical Games. With years of experience as both a competitor and instructor, Tes has a special passion for helping women overcome fear or hesitation around firearms.

"Every woman's story is different," she said. "My approach is to meet them where they are and help them move at their own pace. Firearms training or competition doesn't have to be intimidating, it can be empowering, social, and genuinely fun."

Tes has been one of those people for me, someone who took the time to teach, encourage, and help me find my own confidence on the range. Her knowledge paired with her calm and confident personality has shaped how I approach shooting, and how I aim

to support other women stepping into this space for the first time. From elite athletes to everyday women looking to build confidence and skills, each of these stories shares the same message: start where you are, stay curious, and surround yourself with people who want to see you succeed.

Everyone's journey must start somewhere; you just need to take that first step. For women considering shooting sports, that "somewhere" might be a local range, a safety class, or simply a supportive friend inviting them to join their first competition. I encourage everyone to step up to the firing line. Competition might not be your cup of tea, but I can promise you that the confidence you will gain by simply practicing regularly with your firearm is worth it. Team GLOCK® at a GSSF® Annual Match



The 2025 sport shooting season was a landmark year for Team GLOCK, with athletes earning victories across USPSA, The Tactical Games, and regional competitions nationwide. The team delivered sweeping national titles and personal bests while demonstrating competitive excellence, resilience, collaboration, and a shared passion for advancing the shooting sports community. The Team GLOCK culture and constant pursuit of perfection played a defining role in the Team's success. Team Captain Shane Coley emphasized that athletes pushed their limits individually while lifting one another through mentorship, teamwork, and a shared commitment to continuous improvement.

Morgan Leonhardt made USPSA history in 2025 by winning all eight USPSA Area Championships and the Carry Optics Nationals—a feat no female competitor had achieved before. She navigated demanding stages, back-to-back competitions, and setbacks (including illness) with perseverance and a positive mindset. She refused to quit even under challenging conditions, and history was made.

Thy Ngo also delivered her strongest competition calendar yet, claiming multiple ladies' titles across Regional and Area matches. A key breakthrough came through mental preparation. She used visualization and positive affirmations to build confidence. Thy connected her roots to her competitive achievements when she competed at the Area 4 Championship in her hometown of Dallas, TX. She looks forward to expanding her structured, personalized training in the coming season.

Ashley Robertson returned to iron sight divisions after years of competing with optics and ended the season in the Production Lady's National Championship at USPSA Factory Gun Nationals. Months of focused practice rebuilt her fundamentals and reinforced the importance of mindset, consistency, and showing up with intention.

Callerina Woodard spent the year balancing motherhood with competition. She achieved remarkable success, including a major win at the Iowa Regional Tactical Games event. She entered competitions fully focused, knowing that her family was in full support. She used visualization to enhance mental clarity and stage performance and ultimately came out with a big win during the season.

Team GLOCK Captain, Shane Coley, added another National title in USPSA Limited 10 and earned a podium finish at the Tactical Games Phoenix Regional. His most meaningful accomplishment, however, was seeing the Team's milestones as each athlete elevated both individual performance and the broader team culture. Morgan, Thy, Ashley, and Callerina each reached personal breakthroughs that reflected skill, discipline, and the strength of a supportive, driven environment.

On the heels of historic achievements, championship titles, and unified momentum, Team GLOCK enters 2026 on the heels of the launch of the 6th Generation of GLOCK pistols with higher expectations than ever.

MORGAN LEONHARDT MAKES USPSA HISTORY

In 2025, Team GLOCK's Morgan Leonhardt accomplished something only one other shooter had ever done in USPSA history: a complete season sweep of every USPSA Area Championship in Carry Optics and a win at Factory Gun Nationals.

USPSA's Area matches are a highlight of the sport. They make up eight regional championships that represent a level of practical shooting competition across the country, all preparing for the national championship. Winning a single Area match is difficult, winning nationals poses an even higher challenge. Winning all of them in one season requires consistency, discipline, and the ability to perform under pressure on stages that change dramatically from region to region.

Morgan accepted this challenge. She earned High Lady at all eight Area Championships in Carry Optics, then she ended the season by taking High Lady in Carry Optics at Factory Gun Nationals.

With this run, she became the first woman in USPSA history to sweep all eight Area matches and Nationals in a single season. Morgan's season was structured around a single goal: raising the standard for female competitors.

"At the beginning of the season, I set my sights on becoming the first female to complete the sweep. Accomplishing this goal made this one of the most fun and rewarding years with Team GLOCK."

When you exit Interstate 93 in Manchester N.H., you will find a destination that has become a powerhouse in New Hampshire's shooting sports scene: Manchester Firing Line. Known locally for decades, the business had begun to lose momentum, until Jake and TerryAnn Bowen took charge in 2016 with grit, vision, and a relentless passion for the firearms community.

from a respected but aging range into a modern, thriving hub for shooters of all skill levels. Their mission is to create a space that is welcoming, innovative, and unapologetically dedicated to the safe and responsible enjoyment of firearms, especially GLOCK pistols.

Today, Manchester Firing Line is considered a premier indoor shooting facility in New Hampshire. The facility boasts 14 state-of-the-art lanes, including exclusive VIP lanes reserved for members. The range has become a magnet for locals, law enforcement, competitive shooters, and tourists alike. Located

just minutes from the Manchester-Boston Regional Airport, it's not unusual for travelers to land, grab their luggage, and make the range their first stop.

CONFIDENCE IS CRITICAL: SECONDS SAVE LIVES

PREPARED TO ACT: HOW TRAINING AND MINDSET
SET THE CONDITIONS FOR A LIFE-SAVING RESPONSE

When interviewing a recently retired SWAT officer, John Newton, about lessons learned across more than two decades in law enforcement, I expected that I may hear something about tactics, equipment, or a standout operation. Instead, he paused longer than expected before answering.

He finally said, "The biggest lesson? It is actual best captured by a phrase that you coined and share with your students regularly. That competence creates confidence. And confidence lets you act when seconds matter."

From that answer came a two-part story.

The first part was about returning home from what most would call a "vacation," though it was nothing of the sort. It wasn't spent at a cabin, beach rental, or quiet getaway. It was spent at an external firearms and defensive tactics course, 5 days committed entirely to strengthening pistol fundamentals, improving mechanical efficiency, and sharpening decision-making under stress.

The second was the call he responded to shortly after returning home. A call that demanded every ounce of physical conditioning, mental clarity, problem-solving, and skill he had built. Together, these stories illustrate a truth often spoken in training circles but rarely illustrated so clearly:

When the moment comes, you don't rise to the level of the situation. You fall back to the level of your training.

THE CALL

The 2nd part of the story is when a call came in to the 9-1-1 dispatch as night settled in over a quiet South Florida lake community - cul-de-sacs asleep, sprinklers hissing, humidity thick enough to feel. The calm was broken by a whisper: a person dialing 9-1-1 from inside a bathroom upstairs. His mom was in trouble.

THE RESPONSE

The dispatcher broadcasted an occupied burglary in progress. Patrol units rolled immediately. A K-9 SWAT officer and a third unit accelerated across the district. The timer started the moment wheels began turning.

All three responding officers carried their department-issued GLOCK 21 pistols, mounted with SureFire weapon lights and secured in Safariland® duty holsters.

Officers located the residence and formed a small entry team to safely clear the home. Using standard training and equipment, they moved methodically through the lower level while additional units checked the upper floor. The juvenile was quickly found unharmed upstairs, the suspect was contained, and the family was safely reunited.

WHY TRAINING WAS THE DIFFERENCE

What made this story stand out wasn't just the successful outcome. It was the officer's insight when connecting the call with the training he had completed just weeks earlier.

He described it like a shift, a noticeable recalibration in confidence and mindset.

Firearms training isn't merely about sight alignment and trigger press.

It's about:

- Stress inoculation
- Cognitive load management
- Efficient movement and economy of motion
- Problem-solving under time pressure
- Environmental condition management
- Conditioning the body to support tactical decision-making
- Repetition until confidence becomes second nature

He realized during that course that competence wasn't a luxury. It was a responsibility. During the interview, he described several specific ways training altered his mindset:

Faster recognition meant faster decisions.

He recognized the urgency and diverted immediately. No second-guessing. No hesitation.

Physical conditioning supported tactical decisions.

His physical conditioning had a direct, positive effect on the outcome of the call.

Mastery of equipment.

Because he trusted his GLOCK 21 pistol and knew it intimately, his brain was free to focus on the task at hand. The firearm wasn't a distraction, it was simply an extension of his training.

Confidence under stress.

Confidence under stress helps officers stay steady and think clearly, allowing them to make sound decisions that keep people safe. Confidence doesn't remove stress or uncertainty, but it keeps those factors from controlling the moment.

THE EQUIPMENT FACTOR

Newton's department issued GLOCK 21 pistol was the tool he relied on every day. After years of carrying it, he knew the feel, performance, and reliability, and he trusted it because all his training was done with the same equipment he used on duty.

He emphasized something that often gets overlooked:

"You can't separate mindset, training, and equipment. They work together."

WHY THIS STORY MATTERS

Josh Newton didn't share this incident for recognition, but to highlight a simple reality: competence is a professional responsibility. The public often only sees the final outcome—a safe resolution and a reunited family—but not the extensive training that makes those moments possible. Every step of the response, from the approach to the search to the final decision-making, was efficient because it had been practiced countless times. The time saved in those moments came directly from preparation, and it couldn't have been created any other way.

THE PROFESSIONAL MINDSET

Newton reflects a professional mindset built on confidence in both his preparation and his equipment. He didn't train just to pass a qualification—he trained for whatever situation he might face. That confidence came from repetition, discipline, and carrying a sidearm he knew would perform when it counted. In the end, preparation turns uncertainty into action, because when the moment arrives, you respond with what you've practiced. In John's case, he arrived with confidence by his side.

Deep gratitude to the men and women across the nation and around the world who train, respond, and protect our communities.

MEMPHIS P.D. GOES TO GLOCK® PISTOLS

Memphis, TN is a storied “river city” on the banks of the Mississippi whose history dates back almost 200 years. It is the second largest city in the Volunteer State by population, and is famous for its food (BBQ), music (blues and jazz), and a major transportation hub. A big city also needs a competent and well-equipped police department to protect its citizens, and a primary tool for the law enforcement officer is the handgun. It is with him or her throughout the shift, both to defend themselves and the citizens they have sworn to protect. The Memphis Police Department (M.P.D.) is in the process of receiving one of the very best options current technologies has to offer. M.P.D. has moved away from legacy designed pistols-i.e. metal frames and iron sights-to GLOCK pistols outfitted with a direct mounted red dot optic package.

GLOCK has had now for several years law enforcement packages which combine specific GLOCK models with a designated red dot sight for agency purchase. The red dot is mounted to a precisely machined slide which fits the footprint of the optical sight perfectly with no need for an adapter plate! The M.P.D. specific setup is a G47 MOS pistol with an Aimpoint ACRO P2 sight and backup iron sights. This is known as the MOS7 option, and there are other sights available which have their own designation. The G47 MOS model needs little introduction; originally designed for U.S. Federal Law Enforcement agencies, it has become one of GLOCK's most popular models in law enforcement and civilian sales. It is very close in size to the legendary G17 pistol. Major components are interchangeable with the compact G19, and it



has the GLOCK Marksman Barrel (GMB), ambidextrous slide stop lever, and reversible magazine catch. The trigger action has been praised by serious users and in concert with the marksman barrel produces remarkable accuracy. The Aimpoint ACRO red dot sight is considered to be the original enclosed red dot. It set the standard for ruggedness and reliability and is used by serious operators worldwide. A single cell weapon mounted light completes the package.

We spoke to M.P.D. staff who worked on the transition to GLOCK. Deputy Chief S. Hines, Lt. E. Dobbins and Second Lieutenant Z. Clark all had positive perspectives on the process. In the initial exploration, they had around 100 officers shoot various timed and scored exercises and calculated which combination had the best hit factor. The officers had varying degrees of skill and experiences and were representative of the population of the department. Everyone needed to understand and be on board with a project of this size and complexity. Officer G. Lush spearheaded the project, putting hours in on the evaluation and then the transition to GLOCK pistols and red dot optics. The tests included drawing from duty holsters, target transitions, emergency reloads, and a host of other tasks that an officer may have to perform in a critical emergency. M.P.D. also trains other agencies and used those contacts for information. At evaluation's end, the decision was to go with the MOS7 package. GLOCK Professional's training division also provided armorer and live-fire training to assist the department.

A full 2-day transition training program of instruction was put together. Lieutenants Dobbins and Clark, along with Officer Lush, began the intense work of switching around two thousand officers to the new GLOCK pistols and the associated equipment. As of this report, around 1800 officers have transitioned and the results are extremely gratifying. Scores on shooting evaluations are way up into the 95th percentile. Perhaps as important, the failure rate, where cadets and officers don't qualify and must go into remedial training and cannot work "on the street," has been reduced. With the older pistols and calibers, the failure rate was around 20% in some instances.

Now, with training, GLOCK pistols, and a red dot optic, only a handful of individuals have required additional instruction. With some younger cadet classes, there has been almost no need for extra, time-consuming work.

Deputy Chief Hines has seen a great deal in his decades with M.P.D. He has gone from steel framed pistols with different trigger actions to different calibers and at least two different styles of iron sights. From his perspective, he believes one of the most important results of this department-wide transition is the amount of confidence that has been instilled in the men and women of M.P.D. GLOCK pistols are safe, yet efficient in operation and the red dot sight has helped to improve performance and awareness. Confident officers take care of themselves, their partners, and the community they serve. Memphis is a safer and better place for it.



THE LAWMEN OF HILLSBOROUGH COUNTY, NEW HAMPSHIRE

Hillsborough County, New Hampshire is an 870 square mile area that contains both of New Hampshire's two largest cities and 29 towns, many of which typify the quintessential Colonial New England village.

The Hillsborough County Sheriff's Office, first established in 1772, is responsible for providing a myriad of law enforcement services to the county's 430,000 residents. Unique to the Sheriff's Office, deputies have authority in all the cities and towns across the county and have the authority to enforce the law throughout the state of New Hampshire. The Hillsborough County Sheriff's Office has 30 full-time deputies and 10 part-time deputies that fulfill many diverse roles such as patrol, service of civil process, transportation of prisoners to and from correctional facilities, security of the courts and criminal investigations.

The Criminal Investigations Division is responsible for apprehending fugitives, many of which have fled the state. It is not uncommon for deputies to travel across the U.S. to extradite fugitives to New Hampshire to stand trial. The Criminal Investi-

gation Division is also a highly active participant in the Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) Task Force. The Hillsborough County Sheriff's Office has K9 Unit that included K9 Niko, who is specially trained to detect electronic storage devices, which are frequently involved with ICAC investigations. K9 Niko is the only K9 in the county trained in that manner.

The Hillsborough County Sheriff's Office also has a full-time community services deputy, who spends 100% of his time either assisting with the Police Athletic Leagues or assisting with the elderly in some of the county's more rural areas.

In 2022, the sheriff's office decided that their then current issued sidearm, a traditional double action/single action .40 caliber pistol, was no longer adequate to protect the deputies and the citizens of the county. Many of the deputies advocated for a transition to GLOCK pistols due to their experience with GLOCK at other law enforcement agencies. Many of them personally owned GLOCK pistols. There was also keen interest in making a transition to the 9mm cartridge, pistol mounted optics, and a weapon



mounted light - all things that their then current pistols could not accommodate.

With input from the office's firearms' instructors and rank-file deputies, the decision was made to adopt the GLOCK 45 model, chambered in 9mm Luger, with a red dot optic and weapon mounted light. It was observed by the firearms' instructors that upon adoption of the G45 pistol, qualification scores immediately went up, reliability was noticeably enhanced, and the confidence the deputies had in their sidearm was obvious.

Because of the success the Sheriff's Office had in equipping the deputies with the G45 pistol, the decision was made in 2025 to equip all the Sheriff's Offices' forty-five Court Security Officers (CSO's) with the same model. The Court Security Officers previously had to supply their on duty sidearm via an Individual Officer Purchase (IOP) program. Many of the CSO's took advantage of GLOCK's Blue Label program to source their duty pistol, but there were many CSO's that carried different handguns in several different allowable calibers. This sometimes caused ammu-

nition supply chain issues, and it meant the firearms instructors had to be intimately familiar with numerous pistols. Transitioning the entire staff to GLOCK pistols simplified procurement logistics, policies, procedures, and training.

The simplicity and reliability of GLOCK pistols combined with the uncompromising quality and customer service standards gives law enforcement officers the confidence they need to keep their communities safe.

“As a long-time user and GLOCK Armorer, I can honestly say that GLOCK pistols are the safest and most reliable duty gun. It’s the gun I carry on duty to protect my community and the gun I choose to carry off duty to protect my family.”

OKLAHOMA HIGHWAY PATROL

RIDES WITH GLOCK® PISTOLS

The Oklahoma Highway Patrol (OHP) has chosen GLOCK pistols for their troopers to carry when they cover the highways and byways of the state of Oklahoma. In this article, you will find the process that led the patrol to pick GLOCK pistols, and their experiences with products and the GLOCK company. I had the pleasure of an in-depth interview with Lt. Jason Ross of the OHP, who is based at Troop T, with the OHP Gun Shop and Firearms Training Unit. I also spoke with GLOCK personnel who had a hand in the transition.

The OHP has a nearly 90-year history of protecting the citizens of Oklahoma. It was formed in 1937 by the Governor at the time, E.W. Marland, and the state legislature. Today the OHP patrols 111,994 miles of roads across the state. Like many highway patrols and state police, OHP carried heavy caliber revolvers for years. Several years ago, they began carrying semi-automatic pistols with iron sights. The OHP prides itself on adopting the latest technology to assist troopers in their law enforcement duties. With the rise of red dot sights mounted directly to pistol slides (the design of which GLOCK was a leader in), the patrol began to look at a new sidearm for troopers for efficiency and safety.

Commissioner Tim Tipton brought together the chief, command staff and troopers in early 2024 for a stakeholder meeting to address procuring a new pistol. Upon canvassing this group, it was found that a large majority of those present preferred GLOCK pistols, which had been authorized for use. This is where Jason Ross, a trooper at the time, began his work. He coordinated a range day where personnel from across Oklahoma came and

fired various GLOCK pistols with different optics. Some 300 to 400 rounds were shot by each person to determine which was best in terms of accuracy, speed and target acquisition. This range day was an excellent way to obtain consensus amongst the department. The combination they decided upon was the GLOCK 47 MOS5: a direct-cut package available only to law enforcement with a factory installed GLOCK Performance Trigger and a Trijicon® RMR "HD" red dot sight. It was desirable for an initial shipment to be received by the OHP for an academy class at the end of 2024, and with diligent work by all that objective was achieved.

It was noted with a few of the initial units that a few fasteners for the sights would loosen in training. GLOCK customer service swung into action, and in consultation with the sight manufacturer determined new procedures and standards for mounting the sights. As the combination of pistol and sights were already "in the field" GLOCK factory and local representatives travelled to Oklahoma to ensure that all units were up to the expected standard. This dedication to customer satisfaction is something GLOCK is justifiably famous for, and the patrol is very satisfied with their GLOCK pistols. The final configuration that the Oklahoma Troopers carry on duty is the G47 MOS5 with factory installed GLOCK Performance Trigger, Trijicon RMR HD, backup iron sights with tritium dot front, and Surefire® X300 Turbo weapon light, carried in a Safariland® level 3 holster.

With this equipment delivered, OHP was able to transition 800 of its personnel through a two-day, 1,000 round transition course in just 12 weeks. This is remarkable given that the troopers were spread across 77 counties in the state of Oklahoma. Much credit must be given to the commanders and firearms instructors of OHP to pull the training off efficiently and safely.

Oklahoma citizens and troopers will be well served with these GLOCK pistols, and GLOCK will continue to serve their law enforcement partners with the highest levels of customer service.

The Canadian Sales Manager at GLOCK Inc., James R. Cassells, was a founding member and past Chairman of OTAB and GLOCK continues to be a strong partner of OTAB.

The OTAB executive board brings a cross section of experienced individuals currently serving tactical officers that volunteer their time.

Conference Culture and Community Impact



Under the Tropical Sun

March 2025 brought clear skies and heavy anticipation to the Balboa Shooting Club in Panama City. The IPSC Panama Open, a Level III competition, gathered nearly 160 shooters from across the region. Competitors traveled from Brazil, Ecuador, Guatemala, Costa Rica, Jamaica, Puerto Rico, and the United States, each ready to test their skill under Panama's tropical sun.

The event carried more than the promise of medals. It was the coming together of athletes who shared the same respect for discipline, performance, and each other.

Where Steel Meets Brotherhood

Among the visiting shooters were Team GLOCK Brasil members, Guilherme Klaime and team captain Mauro Thompson. Their focus and consistency drew attention from across the range. Soon they connected with Daniel Siraze of Guatemala, David Vallcarneras of Costa Rica, and Joseline Pinto of Panama — shooters also driven by the GLOCK standard of excellence.

Precision Beyond the Target

Their results confirmed the strength of that unity. Four GLOCK pistol shooters finished within the top three of their divisions, and three earned first-place titles. Each result demonstrated the power of focus and preparation, but also the camaraderie that had developed among them.

Victories on paper were secondary to the sense of purpose that emerged. A bond had formed — one grounded in respect, dedication, and a common goal to elevate the sport across Latin America.

One Word, One Purpose

What began as introductions on the range has grown into the connecting of shooters from multiple nations with one thing in common - GLOCK. United by precision. Driven by passion. Inspired by one word: GLOCK.

A GLOBAL BRIDGE IN PUBLIC SAFETY

The Georgia International Law Enforcement Exchange (GILEE) is an international peer-to-peer training and exchange program housed in the Andrew Young School of Policy Studies at Georgia State University in Atlanta, Georgia. Its mission centers on creating opportunities for law-enforcement leaders from Georgia, other U.S. jurisdictions and partner countries to engage, observe, exchange practices, and learn from one another in real-world contexts.

Founded in 1992, GILEE has grown into a respected venue for executive and command-level officers, offering training not just domestically but across international borders, with the belief that meaningful improvement in policing and public safety often comes through exposure to diverse operational models and cultural perspectives.

GILEE organizes training visits, law enforcement education exchanges, seminars and workshops where participants from Georgia and abroad engage in structured sessions, often hosted by foreign partner agencies or international law-enforcement counterparts. The programming emphasizes leadership development, community-policing strategies, homeland-security awareness and cross-jurisdictional collaboration. For example: during its 30th anniversary, GILEE noted how it helps local agencies to *"learn from police around the world."* GILEE also publishes research, builds partnerships and supports policy dialogue through its roots in academia, connecting practitioners to scholarship in policing, public safety and global security.



In an era where public safety challenges cross borders, GILEE's model offers several benefits:

- It enables law-enforcement executives to reflect on how different legal systems, cultures and organizational structures handle issues like community trust, technology integration and crisis response.
- By learning through external exchanges, participants can bring fresh insights back to their home agencies, sparking innovation or refinements in policy and practice.
- The peer-to-peer nature fosters relationships across jurisdictions which can pay dividends when collaboration or mutual assistance is needed.

Between stations, attendees explored displays of the latest and most iconic GLOCK products and chatted with GLOCK technicians about all things precision and innovation.


